LEO GRADUATION CORD

Last year the President of the Basha High School LEO Club asked if the Lions had a LEO graduation cord. The Lions do not.

After speaking with the Vice Principal, the LEO Advisor and some of the LEOs established the criteria and designed the cord (maroon and gold). The minimum requirements to earn the right to wear the LEO Graduation cord are:

3.6 Grade point average

Two year of active LEO membership

Take part in at least 6 service activities.

The school denied the LEOS the right to wear the LEO cords

at graduation because the school did not recognize the LEO program as a national organization.

On July 9th, we met with the Vice Principal and explained that the LEOs are an International organization. Our intent was to start the graduation cord program at Basha High School and expand it until it ultimately became nationally accepted. After understanding that this is a pilot program, the Vice Principal said that the graduating LEOs will be allowed to wear the LEO Honors Cord.

At the USA/Canada LEO Forum last month we presented the idea of having an official LEO Graduation Honors cord. The Maroon and Gold Graduation

cord was adopted as the official LEO graduation cord for Constitutional Areas 1 & 2.

A link has been setup with the Honors cord company so clubs can order the cords directly. The cords only cost \$6.00 + shipping each.

Clubs can either establish their criteria to earn the cord or use the one set by the Basha High School LEOs. Then, work directly with the schools to allow the LEOs to wear the cords at graduation.

For every dollar donated, the Forest Service will plant one tree in a burned-out area. Donate \$100, plant 100 trees. Donate \$250, plant 250 trees. The more we donate, the more trees will be planted for reforestation. This is a highly effective project for our Environment initiative. For those areas not covered by trees, your donations will be used to buy perennial wildflower seeds - \$1000 buys a 50# bag, enough to cover 2+ acres. Best of all, all donations will be used here in Arizona. This is a great opportunity for every club in MD21 to participate in our Environment initiative, as well as individual Lions to help. Checks for the trees can be made out to USDA-Forest Service and mailed to Buckeye Lions, PO Box 26, Buckeye, AZ 85326 no later than October 23, 2019. We will bundle them all together and present them to the Apache-Sitgreaves Ranger at the Mid-Year luncheon with a big check and a tree. Your wildflower checks can be made out to Buckeye Lions Foundation and mailed to Buckeye Lions, PO Box 26, Buckeye, AZ 85326 no later than October 23, 2019. Be sure to attach a note it is for the wildflower project. We will total the donations and determine how many pounds of seed we can buy and present a flower and report to the Tonto Ranger at the Mid-Year. We will let the rangers plant the trees in the burned-out area near Camp Tativee. We will schedule a multi-district project date after the first of the year and all meet up on a Saturday in the Woodbury Fire area and spread the seeds. We hope to have TV presence at the Mid-Year and the Saturday project day, so please, lets donate lots and make a big difference.

Campaign 100 Club Programs

Campaign 100 has a number of programs that allow clubs at all levels to support the Campaign. Some programs are well suited for one club but not others. However, one of the programs will work for every club. In all programs, individual Lion's donations earn Melvin Jones Fellow credit.

100/100 Club: 100% of the member of a club must donate \$100 to Campaign 100 in one year. This is only a one year obligation and is a members only program. Outside donations do not apply to this program.

Model Club: Clubs are asked to pledge a minimum per member average (PMA) of \$750 between FY 2017/2018 and 2021/2022. This is less that \$250 PMA per year.

Members do not have to donate \$750 each. The club just needs to raise an average of \$750 per member. Donations can come from any source: members, non-member individuals and businesses and the club's treasury.

100 Club: This program is for clubs that don't have the ability to raise the money to be a Model Club. The 100 Club only has to pledge a minimum of \$300 PMA between FY 2017/2018 and 2020/2021. This is less than \$100 PMA per year.

Again, members do not have to donate \$300 each. The club just needs to raise an average of \$300 per member. Donations can come from any source: members, non-member individuals and businesses and the club's treasury.

Classic Club: This program is for clubs that don't have the resources to raise \$300 PMA but still wants to be recognized for their support of Campaign 100. These clubs pledge a minimum of \$150 PMA between FY 2017/2018 and 2020/2021. This is less than \$50 per member average per year.

Once again, members do not have to donate \$150 each. The club just needs to raise an average of \$150 per member. Donations can come from any source: members, non-member individuals and businesses and the club's treasury.

These are minimum donations. Clubs are allowed to donate more than the minimum. Any and all donations by the members and clubs count toward the pledge.

To take advantage of one of these programs, simply decide which program will work best for your club and contact your District Coordinator, or MD Coordinator, for information and the appropriate commitment form.

LIONS add their support to HART PANTRY

Ruth Langford, a member of the Sun City Mid-Week Bell Lions Club of Sun City, Arizona founded the HART PANTRY in 2013;Incorporated the charity into a 501(c)(3) in 2014. The Mission of HART is to reach local high school teens who do not have enough food at home. These young people may truly be homeless, living in shelters, with a friend or in a crisis situation at home with no parent or guardian able to provide care or protection. Working with local Title 1 high schools, and community counselors, their staff strives to provide food and needed services to eligible teens in the NW valley of Maricopa County, AZ.

HART PANTRY, an all volunteer non-profit provides weekend food packs of 18 shelf stable, high protein, single serve food items to get the teen through the weekend when there is no food at the school he or she attends. (these packs are also made available during vacations through local community centers). Snack/supper bags of 5 items are also provided for

week nights. In addition, refurbished bicycles, monthly toiletries, basic clothing, Christmas and graduation gifts and school supplies are provided upon request. HART PANTRY will consider any request presented by the school counselor that will help this teen stay in school to graduate.

To accomplish this program, HART PANTRY is supported by Sun City Mid-Week Bell Lions Club, Sun City, AZ; Host Lions Club, Sun City, AZ; Early Bird Lions Club, Sun City, AZ; Surprise Sun Village Lions Club, Surprise, AZ; and the Lions Foundation at 5491 N. 99th Ave, Sun City, AZ where the HART PANTRY is located. In addition to the support received by fellow Lions, Ms Langford receives grants from the Cities of Peoria and Surprise AZ; many corporate partners such as APS and Discount Tire Corp; Funding is also provided by 8 local churches, civic groups like FROM THE HEART in Glendale, AZ and the community at large.


Food insecurity is a major problem among our youth and especially our teens who because of peer pressure or other factors do not readily seek help. HART PANTRY seeks to find these young folks and let them know that someone cares; that they "are enough" and seeking help is ok. To this end HART PANTRY with its 40 volunteers, Executive Board of 12 members and Executive Director Langford is constantly seeking to provide support and encourage teens to finish high school and increase self-esteem. There seems to be no end in sight to the fact that so many children go to bed hungry, get up hungry and are expected to perform the tasks of school and life when all they really want to do is eat a meal, have a warm bed and a safe environment in which to survive. A hungry kiddo cannot concentrate on much of anything except being hungry.





Find the needs. Develop as many visible projects and activities as you are able. Always invite others to help. Teach our credo of service. Let others see what you do. Show others how to Catch your Dream of Service.

COULD ADDING A BRANCH TO YOUR CLUB HELP YOU RECRUIT YOUNGER LIONS?

Are you finding that your club is serving less due to an aging membership, and you are not having success at recruiting younger Lions? As you attempt to recruit, are you hearing "I want to serve, but I don't want to join a traditional club" or "I don't have time for meetings or to serve as an officer". Perhaps it might be time to consider forming a branch.

A branch is a group of Lions within your club, that operate as a "mini-club". They rely upon your club's infrastructure to manage the administrative functions, so they are free to serve with few club duties. They choose their own meeting times, traditions and projects and set their own dues. They may decide to be a cyber branch, thereby eliminating the need for physical meetings. Therefore, your club can continue meeting and operating as it has, but you can also recruit Lions that can meet and serve as they desire. Your club benefits because it continues to serve and grow. The branch Lions are full members of your club, and can step up to leadership roles in the club and beyond.


This is an excellent way for a legacy club that may be finding it difficult to continue to do service projects to expand its membership and serve in new areas. A branch could be started with a group of Lions that cannot regularly attend your meetings due to work. Other opportunities could be groups of people who want to work on one specific project, and would benefit from the Lions name, insurance, image/brand and nonprofit status. Partnerships with churches, civic groups, neighborhood organizations, schools, parents, etc., are perfect places to seek out small groups to recruit as separate branches. This could also be a company that wants to support their employees serving and sponsors them to join your club as a group. How about a young mother's branch that meets at playtime and one person watches the kids while the others do a service project. A group of parents that support their kid's sports team or band and need to raise funds and cover insurance. The branch can also

recruit new Lions on their own, thereby expanding your service footprint further. The opportunities are only limited by your imagination. Remember, these are not strangers that you are supporting, these are your Lions doing your Lions service under your club's name.

Organization is simple, your club board approves the concept, you find a person/s to form the group, you join the Lions to your club in MyLCI and then establish the branch in MyLCI and identify a minimum of 5 Lions as members of the branch in MyLCI. A branch liaison is appointed, a president of the branch is elected and you are rolling.




